Artist Notes

I found some lovely pine needles in Bushy Park that had fallen in one of the recent storms, so brought that back to the studio to draw, starting with some random acrylic ink patterns as background before moving onto drawing the outline with a fineliner – I use a Faber Castell Pitt Artist pen. I coloured the needles using watercolour. The good thing about the acrylic ink is that it stays put once dry, so you can paint over it without any worry. The result is pictured above, top left. I was actually quite pleased with the result.

Another little piece of inspiration came from me moving the last of my favourite books down to the studio. These are a combination of interior design, nature, floral, textile art and geometric print and pattern books. They are full of beautiful photography, colour and mark making ideas and as I started to flick through one book, came across a photograph of some pebbles that were all different shades of grey. I grabbed some charcoal and a bit of paper and started sketching. I wasn't looking for anything spectacular, but just a little piece of fun to keep my eye in and the creative ideas floating around in my head, so it didn't just fill up with what else needed to be done before Santa arrived.
